What do you Aspire to? The ASPIRE programme delivered to the Sixth Form has been designed to help develop skills that we will need throughout life.

"The 'Leadership' unit teaches what a leader is and helped me to see what I needed to do to be a good leader. In the very first lesson we were asked to compete against other teams to build tents in the fastest possible time. It initially just seemed like a fun activity, but it was only when we analysed our role within the teams, did it become clear that it showed how well we worked in a team and who the natural leaders were. I was able to effectively establish my strengths and weaknesses and could see which skills I would need to work on in order to work towards becoming a leader. This was very helpful because I learnt that it was not a race, but a challenge to see which skills I was able to incorporate in the task.

The major task in this unit was to create a lesson for a group of Year 7 students. We worked as a team to develop activities that would suit our allocated students. After the development stage, we worked as a team to lead the students through the lesson that we had put together for them. Throughout this process we were communicating with the students to ensure that they were motivating each other, also teaching them it doesn't matter if you get things wrong, as long as you learn from it and from this your confidence will also grow.

I would like to give a big thanks to Dr Badyal, Miss Callaghan, Mr Lee, Mrs Kinsella, Mr Arnull and Mr Slack for going out of their way to deliver this fantastic programme to Sixth Form." - Tanika (Year 12)

EU Referendum

On the 23rd June the students of Q3 Academy joined the rest of the United Kingdom in casting their vote in an 'In-out' Referendum on Britain's membership of the European Union. In what proved to be a wonderful expression of democracy, 91% of students took the opportunity to make their voice heard on what proved to be a passionately debated issue.

The visit was rounded off nicely with a sunny day, screaming on the rollercoasters at Port Aventura – in Spanish, of course!




Paris
