Duke of Edinburgh Award by Mr D. Snell

This year there are 32 students in total, 22 on the Bronze Award and 10 on the Silver Award. As usual, they have had to complete four different types of activity at Bronze and Silver level. These are the Volunteering, Physical, Skills and Expedition activities. Students have taken part in a wide range of activities, including volunteering in the local community; sports leader qualifications; and a variety of physical challenges such as snorkelling, gymnastics, football, dance and swimming.

Our students have gained much from these activities, developing compassion, commitment and confidence. Through the Physical section in particular they developed their fitness and teamwork. The Expedition activity is the final challenge... a chance to test their skills and level of determination in and against the natural elements.

This year our students have planned and trained for an adventurous journey in the Peak District at the end of July. In preparation for this they have attended Monday morning training sessions throughout the year, developing skills in map reading, navigation and first aid to name a few. These sessions concluded with a practice expedition in Shropshire. Students successfully navigated through the countryside over three days. They also had to pitch tents and cook food - developing their teamwork and pushing themselves beyond their expectations.



It was a pleasure to observe their behaviour in and around the campsite each evening. I witnessed many students leading their own activities independent from staff, such as playing Frisbee, body weight training exercises, sprint training and football juggling! I'm not sure how they had the energy to do these activities after some of the longest walks completed in the Award over recent years, but they were an absolute delight and a real credit to Q3 Academy.

I wish the students the very best of luck for their final expedition, they are well prepared and excited for the challenge and I'm sure they will complete it successfully.

Sport Leaders

Year 11 students are coming to the end of their Level 1 Sport Leaders Programme which will culminate in each student demonstrating one hour of leadership.

The year 12 Level 2 Sport Leaders are also coming to the end of their course and have completed six units of work; developing leadership skills, leading activities that promote a healthy, active lifestyle, making activity sessions inclusive, positive role models in sport and pathways in sport and recreation. To successfully gain their qualification, the group must demonstrate ten hours of leadership, and have already organised and delivered a multi-skills session to year 2 students at Ferndale. They are currently in the planning stages of an inter-company football competition, which they will be running for Q3 students during National School Sports Week. The group are on target to pass the course following completion of their ten hours of leadership in July.

The Level 3 Sport Leaders are currently volunteering within the community to gain their thirty hours of leadership, working within holiday play schemes, community coaching schemes and local primary schools to gain diverse experience and fulfil the requirements of their qualification. They have shown exceptional levels of commitment and they are also all on track to successfully complete their course in July.


After a year group photo, the students took the short walk to St Margaret's church where they shared memories and experiences of their time together.
