The Q3 Election

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Students and Staff at both Academies were excited to see if they successfully predicted the national outcome again, with over 1,500 students and staff across both sites taking part in the national vote. Q3 Academy Great Barr successfully predicted the General Election outcome in 2015 and the shock EU referendum result in 2016.



Posing with current Prime Minister Teresa May and Labour Leader Jeremy Corbyn, students and staff went to the polls and cast their vote for which party they felt had the best manifesto for this country. The run up to this Election included giving school children the opportunity to have an in-depth look into current politics, allowing students as young as 11 years old to vote in a real life scenario.

The purpose of this is to educate young people (voting and nonvoting age) about politics, British Values, democracy and the voting system. All students and staff were asked to vote to see if internally our results reflected the national landscape.

When questioned about what he would do if he was Prime Minister, Arjun from Q3 Academy Langley said: "I would put more money into schools to ensure all have a decent education and abolish the University Tuition Fees." Lead Professional for Humanities Mr Jack Mills said: "The election campaigns have been stirring lively debates across the Q3 Academies Trust. Ahead of the mock General Election, students have heard assemblies addressing the core themes of the democratic process and had the opportunity to discuss the party manifestos in their tutor groups. It has been another successful week of democratic engagement for both the Great Barr and Langley sites and we remain incredibly proud of the enthusiasm shown by the students."

Q3 Academy Great Barr: Labour won with 469 votes

Q3 Academy Langley: Labour won with 104 votes

Dr Nira Chamberlain pays a visit to students and staff at Q3 Academy Langley

Students and staff were treated to a visit by the inspirational and very amusing Dr Nira Chamberlain on Tuesday 4th July. Described by the Science Council as 'one of the UK's top 100 Scientists' Dr Nira is a renowned Mathematician, Mathematical Modeller and Data Science Consultant, and proud of it.

He regaled stories of his childhood growing up in a Birmingham Suburb and when he asked his careers advisor at school what path he should take he was told a boxer. It was his parents that advised him to follow his passions and said "you don't need anybody's permission to be a mathematician". He explained how he has used his passion for Maths to create algorithms which have helped with the Ebola crisis. He created Chamberlain's method of Long Multiplication when he was volunteering in a Birmingham youth school. He also explained how he used the T-Mobile Flash Mob in Liverpool Street Station in London to explain human behaviour and mathematical modelling.

All the students and staff were inspired by his passion and enthusiasm for Mathematics. The talk was organised by Speakers 4 Schools.

Mr Arnull begin the proceedings with some nostalgia about his own teenage years and how he was inspired to do something big, to have dreams and do everything with passion. He encouraged the students to treat everyone with respect so that they are only limited by imagination and fear of failure. He finished his speech by reading the 'Man in the Arena' by Theodore Roosevelt.

This year's Sponsor's Dinner was reflective, with great sadness at the passing of a wonderful student who sadly lost her battle with Cancer. In her honour the awards were changed this year to reflect students who had shown true grit and determination in times of huge adversity.

Mr Payne, upon introducing Debbie Flood (Olympic Rower) to the invited guests, staff and students told a story of complainers and contributors. He encouraged students to be contributors, who have true determination and attitude to succeed.

Debbie Flood did not disappoint in her message to the students. She



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Q3 Sixth Form Student Takes Karate Gold

Q3 Academy Great Barr Sixth Form student Lewis Bradbury has finished his time at the Academy with a spectacular Gold Medal, awarded to him in the Under 21 Male Kumite Category at the BKF Home Nations 2017 on Saturday 27th and Sunday 28th May. The draw saw him go up against some strong and experienced fighters, but he managed to defeat them all to take the Gold.

This is an amazing achievement as Lewis is in the middle of his final A-Level examinations. He has already been given an Unconditional offer to study Psychology at Coventry University this September.

A spokesperson for Japan Shotokan Karate (JKS) England said: *This is a great achievement and well done Lewis".* When asked about his achievements Lewis said: *Having* been at Q3 Academy from Year 7 through to Year 13, I am grateful for the support from the School and staff, both academically and also in pursuit of my chosen sport, Karate for the past 6 years.

I first started competing in Year 8 and have enjoyed increasing success ever since.

I became JKS English Champion in 2014 for my age group and again in 2015 in under 18 years and last year 2016.

I competed in the JKS European championships where I won 2 Bronze medals and last month I became the under 21 BKF British Champion. This was possible due to the support I receive from Q3 Staff who allowed me the time to compete, but also ensured I didn't miss any of my educational lessons. I train over six hours a week at my club and also train in my own time at home, whilst still studying academically for my A level exams. I aim to continue teaching and competing in Karate when I go to University as I think it is important to maintain a healthy body and mind and have a good education. If you are committed to a project or sport and an education, it is possible, but you do have to work.

I am proud of my achievements so far, and am a firm believer, that in order to succeed you have to push yourself to limits you didn't know existed."

Mr Lee was honoured on Friday 16th June 2017 with a prestigious nomination for the Pearson Teaching Award Head Teacher of the Year. This was voted for by the current Year 7 cohort of parents and carers that have children at the Academy.

It also shows the strength and commitment by Mr Lee and his dedicated staff team to ensure that no child is left behind in Sandwell and particularly the Oldbury area where Q3 Academy Langley is situated. Sixth Form Leavers' Tea Party



We wish them all the best in their future endeavours and look forward to sharing their successes in years to come.








Chromosomes are pulled apart in opposite directions to form chromatids.





The Science Department

All teachers are creative, we have to be! This year, the Science Department at Q3 Academy Great Barr have taken creativity and innovation to a new level, to engage our young learners and instil a deep rooted love of all things scientific.

This year's learning journey has led students down a unique and unusual pathway; activities used and developed within lessons have taken classes on a rollercoaster adventure. It is not unusual for students to substitute books and paper for windows, tables, floors and even toilet paper!

Our re-designed KS3 curriculum has allowed students to engage in a variety of practical activities spanning from the expected Bunsen burner investigations to designing and racing their own cars on a purpose-built scalextric track. Our fresh ideas have drawn the attention of Dendrite and we have secured funding to develop this activity even further next year. The competition is on for all Year 7 students who will design and build a rocket car to enter into a national competition 'The Bloodhound Race for the Line'. Bring on a Q3 victory!

If the race track didn't set their pulses racing, students across the Academy have also had the opportunity to develop a unique set of cooking skills. Could you make ice-cream without a freezer? Bake a cake without an oven? Pop some popcorn without a pan? Students at Q3 Academy Great Barr certainly can! The Science Department have embraced their inner Mary Berry and trialled a range of activities which aim to tackle difficult scientific concepts.

The unique approach to teaching and learning has been a huge success and will be developed further for the next academic year! To break the stigma and attitudes related to traditional revision techniques, the department has put a huge emphasis on the development of activities which enable students to recap and develop knowledge without rote learning. Our active and meaningful revision tasks have included: revision rolex, revision roll-it, Scrabble, Rapidough, Tarsia puzzles, snakes and ladders, A-Z, paper chains and stop motion animation alongside more traditional techniques with a O3 twist! We expect this to have a huge impact on current students and have been delighted by the feedback from classes who have been involved so far!

2017-18 will see us continue to develop strategies and techniques to make sure that the teaching of Science at Q3 is the best that it can possibly be.



Cadets Update

Q3 Academy is very excited to announce that from September 2017, we will have a Combined Cadet Force (CCF) Royal Air Force (RAF) Detachment.
