Emma, Ché & Vigash share an interesting insight into new technology

Over the decades machines have been a huge part of our world, changing the way we live, work and exist. But what happens when they are given the right of consciousness and their own free will? What happens when machines begin to learn?

AlphaGo, from Google's 'Deepmind' project (a self-learning A.I) made a revolutionary step forward when it beat Lee Sedol, a professional player at the game of GO. The game of GO originated in China more than 2,500 years ago with simple rules, but great complexity; there are more possible positions than atoms in the universe! So how did a machine beat Lee Sodel at the world's hardest game?
